

#### GOLDEN NUGGETS

- 1717 Sir Isaac Newton, master of the British Mint, established a fixed price for gold equivalent to about \$20 per ounce (Troy.)
- 1792 Alexander Hamilton, first U.S. Secretary of Treasury under President George Washington, priced the American dollar at 24 ¾ grains of gold (not quite 1/20 of an ounce, making its price \$19.39.)
- This set the "gold standard."
- The price of gold remained approximately \$20 per ounce until February 1934, a period of 142 years.

### Gold in America: History Might Surprise You

Historical information herein is from documents written by geologist Palmer C. Sweet of the Virginia Division of Mineral Resources.

The only known reference to gold in the southern Appalachians was published in the 18th century and appears in Thomas Jefferson's notes on Virginia. He described a piece of ore, found in 1782 on the bank of the Rappahannock River, that yielded 17 pennyweight of gold.

Placer gold mining started in Virginia about 1804. Lode gold mining quickly followed. Gold from Virginia and Startest St

ginia and South Carolina was sent to the mint in 1829 and from Georgia in 1830.

Thomas Jefferson wrote of this in his "Notes on Virginia", "I know a single instance of gold found in this state. It was interspersed in small specks in a lump of ore, of about four pounds weight, which yielded seventeen pennyweight of gold, of extraordinary ductility."

The principal mining boom in Virginia ran from about 1827-1861. From 1800 to the present there have been approximately 245 gold mines in Virginia.

In 1782 a 0.85-ounce gold nugget was discovered on the north side of

the Rappahannock River near Little Falls plantation in Stafford County, Virginia.

The New Yorker newspaper (June 2, 1838) reported that, in 1831, the "weekly product of the [Virginia] mines was then about \$100,000 in value, or \$5,000,000 annually. But a small part of the gold is sent to the U. S. mint; by far the largest part is sent to Europe, particularly to Paris. The Gold mines of Virginia have only attracted attention since 1827, the first Gold noticed as received at the U. S. Mint from Virginia was in 1829, amounting to \$2,500. The quantity received in 1833 had increased to \$104,000."

### Historic Independence Mine Headframe to be Restored

From Alma to Victor, Park and Teller counties are filled with mining history. Today, Victor is still the base of modem gold mining activity. Newmont Mining Corporation, headquartered in Greenwood Village, CO, acquired the Cripple Creek & Victor gold mine from AngloGold Ashanti Ltd. in August, 2015. Newmont has maintained a commitment to preserving the visible history of the Cripple Creek Gold District - "The World's Greatest Gold Camp." As one of it's newest endeavors, Newmont recently announced it's project to preserve the historic Independence Mine Headframe.

From Newmont Mining: Entropy and the subsidence of its underground mine workings have caused the magnificent Independence Headframe to require an investment in its rehabilitation and preservation. The Cripple Creek Mining District is Colorado's paramount gold producing area and the Independence Mine Headframe, located in the district just north of the City of Mines, Victor, Colorado, may be the state's most iconic gold mining structure.

Winfield Scott Stratton laid claim to what would become his fortune on July 4, 1891—the Independence Mine. He eventually sold the mine for \$11 M and because he was certain about the long-term potential of Cripple Creek, he invested heavily in the mining claims around the area. In addition to his mining investments, Stratton made significant philanthropic contributions to infrastructure in the city of Colorado Springs; to education at the Colorado

School of Mines; and to the Myron Stratton Foundation. This is why Newmont and the State of Colorado are investing in the preservation of this landmark mining structure.



To this point, the on-going rehabilitation project has involved stabilizing the ground around the Independence Headframe, but in late August; Newmont began significant construction on the structure itself. The original timber and hardware will be reused as much as possible; however, to stabilize the headframe so it will continue to stand against the test of time, deteriorated parts of the structure will be replaced. This will require that the entire structure be disassembled from the top down. This method will allow for the complete inspection of the structure as it is resembled.
