Lil' Nuggets

Ore - is defined as a naturally occurring material from which a mineral, or minerals, of economic value can be extracted.

Grade - The relative quantity or percentage of ore mineral content in a body of rock. For gold usually expressed as ounces of gold per ton.

Lode deposit - A mineral deposit in consolidated rock as opposed to most placer deposits which are in unconsolidated materials

Bench deposits - are created when gold reaches a stream bed. Gold accumulations in an old stream bed that are high are called bench deposits. They can be found on higher slopes that drain into valleys.

Gold Panning (Chalk Creek Canyon. CO)

The Chalk Creek canyon was once home to the Chalk Creek mining district, one of Colorado's richest mining districts. During the 1870's and 1880's the towns of Hortense, Alpine, St. Elmo, Romley and Hancock thrived as a result of the discovery of gold and silver-laden ore.

Most all of the historic mines are located on private property and visitors cannot access these mines without property owners permission.

Gold panning is permitted along the Chalk Creek. The best section for panning is located west of Cascade campground.

Directions:

From Buena Vista, Colorado, travel south for about 7 miles on Highway 285. Turn right onto County Road 162, and travel west passing the Mt. Princeton Hot Springs resort (private), for 6 miles. An information kiosk is located on the right side of the road, just across from the Colorado Trail (#1776)

Blast from the Past

A Novel Mining Scheme

Silver Cliff Rustler, April 23, 1902

Methods of gold recovery are developing with startling rapidity, but the following report taken from a recent issue of a New York daily paper is particularly interesting. It looks as if Mr. Mulhatton had turned his reportorial energies in tho direction of mining enterprises: A novel scheme has been discovered by several farmers in the Big Hole River, in Wyoming, for saving the flour gold along that stream, which had defied all the efforts of ingenuity of miners for many years. On the big bench which lies in the Big Hole Basin, a few miles from Wisdom, there is an immense, glacial moraine, covering an area of several thousand acres, and tests which have been made show that this immense deposit carries a value of about \$2 in gold to the ton.

The gold is as fine as flour, and will float on water. Often in many years prospectors have attempted to save the gold by ground sluicing, panning, washing it over blankets, and every other means known to placer miners, but all proved failures. It was the conclusion that the gold could not be saved and would lie forever just without the reach of man. A few years ago a land company acquired possession of several thousand acres of this land and began breaking it up and seeding it down for grass. Recently an accidental discovery was made of the means of saving the fine gold by several man engaged in ploughing. One of the ploughs in use on the ranch was an old one which had been bolted together with copper bolts.

Part of the ranch which was ploughed up was an old placer dump at the mouth of Moose Creek, which had been washed over a number of years by placer miners, who had made an earnest effort to save values in the old moraine, but without success. It fell to the lot of the old copper bolted plough to turn over the old dump. One day the ploughman noticed something peculiar about the appearance of the bolt heads on the old plough. He investigated and found that on each of the bolt heads a chunk of amalgam had formed. He removed them and had the amalgam retorted, and secured about 50 cents in gold from each bolt head. The ranchers now believe they have made a discovery by which all the gold in the old moraine may be saved. They have had all their ploughs copper plated on the under side of the mould board, and are now engaged in ploughing and reploughing the old glacial moraine, and expect to make a fortune in gold instead of hay. Hg

Mercury is a chemical element with symbol Hg and atomic number 80.

It is commonly known as quicksilver and was formerly named hydrargyrum A heavy, silvery d-block element, mercury is the only metallic element that is liquid at standard conditions for temperature and pressure.

Mercury occurs in deposits throughout the world mostly as cinnabar (mercuric sulfide). The red pigment vermilion is obtained by grinding natural cinnabar or synthetic mercuric sulfide.

Mercury remains in use in scientific research applications and in amalgam for dental restoration in some locales. It is also used in fluorescent lighting. Electricity passed through mercury vapor in a fluorescent lamp produces shortwave ultraviolet light, which then causes the phosphor in the tube to fluoresce, making visible light.

Mercury poisoning can result from exposure to water-soluble forms of mercury (such as mercuric chloride or methylmercury), by inhalation of mercury vapor, or by ingesting any form of mercury.






Sluicing



Sluicing Clear Creek

As appearing in The Gold Nugget, May 1997 by **Steve Cychosz**

When using a sluice box in streams where you expect to find flakes and, just maybe, nuggets, you can run about three inches of fast water through the sluice. On Clear Creek, however, we have a lot of



packed behind the riffles and beginning to cover the carpet.

To check to see if you are getting all the gold you expect, fill your pan with the tailings at the end of your sluice and check them for any gold you might be losing. With this method, you are not likely to find anything that was not trapped.

flour gold and you're going to lose it out the end of the sluice if you run it with fast water.

Although you may trap and recover gold flakes, fast water in a sluice on Colorado's Clear Creek will cause the flour gold to become suspended in the flow and it will not have time to settle behind the riffles. Because we do not recover much in the way of larger flakes and nuggets over a quarter of an inch in Clear Creek, but do have an abundance of flour gold, you should adjust your sluice box to have only about two inches of water running through it with just a small wave over each riffle. The sluice may be even with the water or only tipped at a very slight angle of just an inch or two over the entire length of the box.

Prior to using your sluice, classify your material down to 1/4 of an inch. Use a trowel to feed the classified material into the sluice, two full trowels at a time. Then wait a minute or two for the material to run through the box before adding more.

You will not lose any gold if you run your sluice box this way in Clear Creek. True, you won't be moving as much
